Public land (including old growth forest) at risk on Oak Ridge Reservation

There are rumors that the Department of Energy in Oak Ridge has committed to transfer a 900-acre tract of the Oak Ridge Reservation, known as "Self-Sufficiency Parcel 2" (SSP-2), to a local government or economic development entity for economic development, and that the receiving entity intends to convey the entire tract to a single entity for an industrial project that would use a fraction (less than half) of the land area.

This news is extremely disturbing. Below are specific concerns:

- The proposed transfer of such a large tract of U.S. public land to a private interest should have been publicly reviewed with an environmental document.
- The use of the land should be considered in a local comprehensive land-use plan.
- An outside corporation should not be given permanent control of a large piece of the City of Oak Ridge when the land area greatly exceeds the needs of their proposed project. Unlike the adjacent counties that have large rural areas potentially suitable for development, Oak Ridge has very little land that is both available and suitable for development.
- SSP-2 includes a tract of forest land that has been identified as "old growth forest" (meaning there is no evidence that humans ever logged it) and should be preserved as a site for research and educational visitation, as well as a source of community pride. Please communicate with the officials listed below and ask that they use their authority or position to help ensure that any transfer of SSP-2 land is limited to the area that the prospective tenant is reasonably expected to need, and that the old growth forest is protected. Furthermore, please ask that that future actions related to this area are appropriately addressed in local land-use planning.
